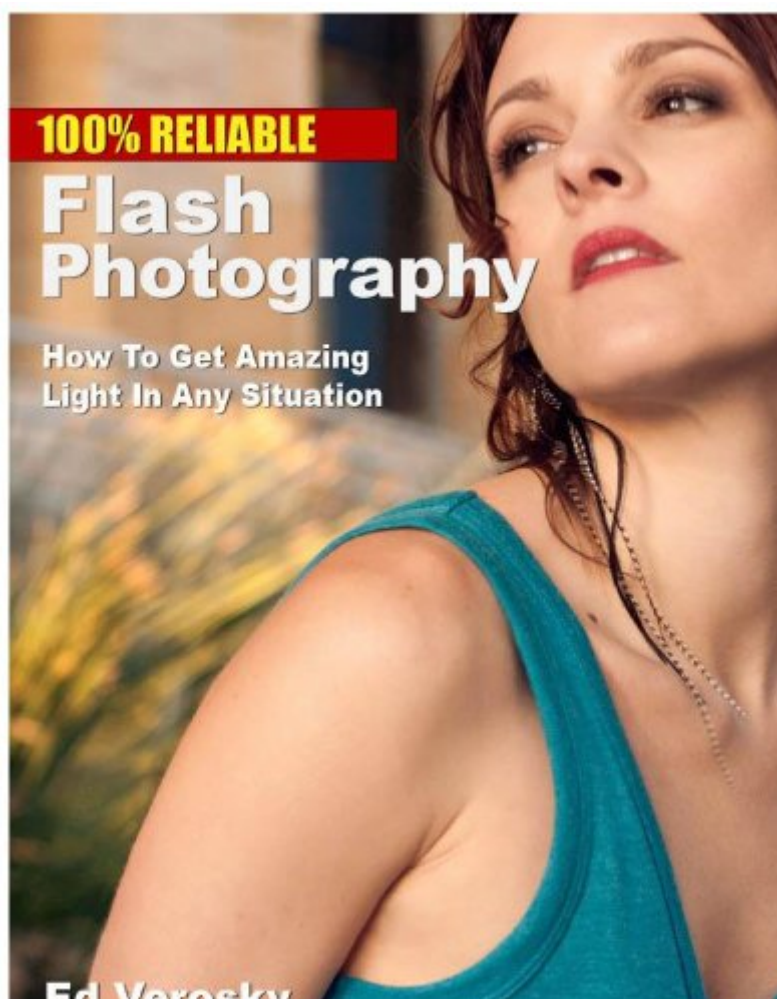

The first part of the book covers relevant lighting and gear knowledge mostly focusing on how to do some really good work with a simple on-camera flash, or even basic household lighting. There are also off-camera flash techniques including detailed instructions for a basic two-light manual setup that serves as Verosky's typical gear for editorial work. This leads into the core chapter, Standardization, which is about making your gear easier to use and eventually master. The book continues with techniques, examples and diagrams for indoor and outdoor lighting, then several "backstories" quickly detailing shoots with several of the portrait subjects featured in the book.

I've been playing with photography for about 7 years but have only begun using flash over the past 5 months. I was one of those "natural light only shooters". Yup, I had no clue how to use flash and every time I tried to use it the photo turned out horrible. About 5 months ago I was attempting to take a portrait style photograph of my 11 year old granddaughter. It was a very bright and hazy day and the sun was just past noon. So I knew enough that I wouldn't be able to take a good photograph without seeking overhead cover which we did. I took 2 sets of photo's one using the cameras meter and the other a Sekonic L308S. As it turned out both sets were horrendous while the Sekonic exposed the photos properly the results were flat lighting and those dark shadows in the eye sockets among other problems. It was then I made the decision that I had to learn at least the basics of flash use. I searched youtube for flash photograpy and practiced to learn the use of flash as a fill and from there to use it with modifiers. It was on youtube that I saw Mr. Verosky's videos. I liked the way he presented himself and that his videos were short and always on point. I assumed this book would be presented in the same way and I wasn't disappointed there is no fluff the book is all business. This book is great for the person who is looking for a starting point to learn flash photography. IMO this book is best used as a supplement to many of the youtube videos regarding flash use. I would think it would be difficult for a total flash newbie to buy this book and put some of the recipes into use and get decent results if you don't understand the terminology and basics. Watching one or two flash videos on youtube will make this book and its recipes easier to understand and to put them into practice. Just like Mr Verosky I too have a (recipe) starting point for flash use, my settings are different but so is my equipment I'm so anal about those settings that I've created cheat sheets for both both inside and outside, bare flash and for all my modifiers. I can attest that having starting points makes creating the image you want easy and fast. If you're like I was a "natural light photographer" and thinking of learning flash then this book in combination with a few youtube videos and practice will make learning flash a snap

I've always been intimidated by electronic flash since TTL results seem hit or miss. Verosky's techniques are darn near fool-proof and his explanations are crystal clear. He makes a great case for shooting all-manual and provides "100% reliable" set-up suggestions that then can be creatively tweaked. Each one is accompanied by an illustration that precisely locates each light, the subject and the camera. For my money, this is one of the best flash photography books I've run across. Highly recommended.
