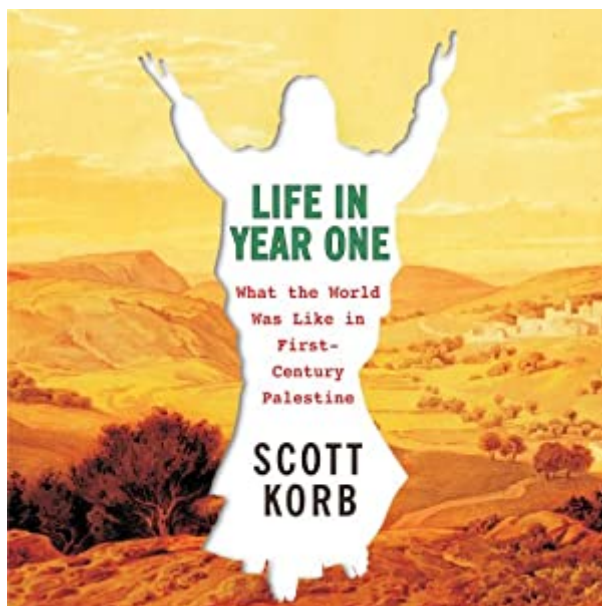

I didn't like this book because it is not well-written. The author's sentences are so run-on that by the time I get to the end of his sentence, I have forgotten the subject. I am continuing to slog through the book, because he has a great deal of good information. But the book is difficult to read. I have learned, that if I read it out loud, I can follow his train of thought. The book seems to be a transcription of his lectures, with frequent post scripts added in parenthetically. I would not recommend this book for these reason.

An easy read with not as much hard information about year 1 as I had hoped. More informed speculation, but understandable given 2000 years have passed. The amount of verifiable writings from that period are limited.

An interesting and easy read, but the author is frustrating in his views. It does help picture the world that Jesus lived in.

I found it to be a compelling book and would recommend it to anyone with an interest in ancient history.

This is an oddly frustrating book. An interesting subject, there are real gems here, but these gems are buried in junk observations and silly self-referential footnotes. Nearly a third of this book's 208 pages are footnotes. Bad footnotes. Stupid footnotes. So many footnotes (of no note) that it became difficult at times to even read as you're jumping from the top of the page to the bottom, back to the top, and again to the bottom, before jumping to the top again. And to lose your place on the page to read some dumb crap like "I thought so too," is just silly.
