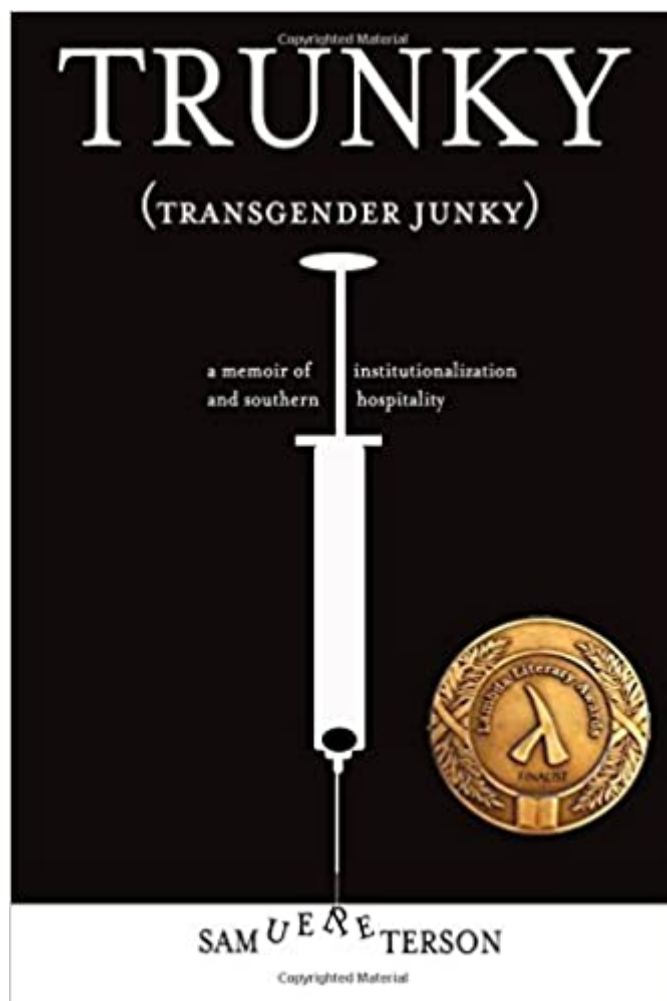

An entertaining, idiosyncratic, and ultimately moving book that deals with big stuff — trauma, the body, gender, addiction — with candor and self-deprecation. Peterson's eye is always aware of the ways in which we primp, posture, and pose, the ways in which we create narratives and personae that allow us to find a place in the world. At the same time, Peterson shows how these narratives can lock us away from others and short-circuit our ability to be who we really want or need to be. Through the exploration of his experiences of addiction, recovery, and relapse, of dysmorphia and transition, Peterson suggests that through persistent critique of our own personal narratives and an open-minded engagement with those of others, we can get better and become better. But *Trunky* spares us the self-help treacle; this is a bittersweet memoir, brooding and depressive, but also witty and full of hope.

A wry, intelligent look at addiction and recovery that, thankfully, doesn't deal in self-pity except to call it out. Peterson's honesty about the thinking that leads to addiction made his descriptions relatable and moving. His account of the underlying difficulties of being trans in an institutional setting, and the lack of transitional housing when it was time to leave, is a disturbing and important addition to our public discourse on addiction treatment. His use of language is refreshing. Honestly thought I'd have to plow through it, since addiction has been somewhat done to death in memoirs, but couldn't put it down.
