

I was fortunate to be an early reader of this book and I loved every bit of it. Let me preface this review with two statements: first, memoir is not my favorite genre; second, I'm a high school English teacher, so I'm a judgmental reader. Soro's latest book is memoir done right. She broke my heart and made me laugh over and over again, often on the same page. I think to survive being a part of a family often requires armor, and Soro is properly suited in this work. She deftly blends her particular brand of humor with the heartbreak of caring for an aging parent who lives on another continent. The combination of Soro's privileged poverty, some odd health woes, and a highly critical mother could weigh down a memoir (and that's the true problem with this genre), but Soro's skill as a comedy writer pairs with her acerbic and somehow simultaneously charming tone to take the reader on a journey with her. We know she suffers, but she doesn't want us to suffer with her—she wants us to laugh. Soro is self-effacing without being too earnest, hilarious without being too blunt, and spot on when it comes to family secrets, and her family is absolutely rife with secrets. Note the first two sentences of her book: "I believe women can't keep a secret because they talk too much. I believe men can because they aren't listening to you in the first place." It's the perfect beginning to a perfectly awful tell pretty well-told. I highly recommend this memoir, readers.

It was nice to read a story about someone else being mentally tortured by their mother. I read the entire book by the glow of my kindle, under the covers so I could giggle at every misstep. Don't worry; Ms. Soro lived to tell the tale, so it's okay to laugh at her misery. I love her—if anything can go wrong, it will go wrong—tales about her life as she jumps from the side of her bedridden mother in France, to her hovel, er, I mean apartment in California. I still haven't decided whether her sister is friend or foe. I got right into this book because the author and I have the same math skills, and 200 grams really does mean 200 grandmothers. It's sad that she had to explain that to the rest of you. I hope someday Ms. Soro will reiterate and explain exactly what she meant by "Horses were my first real boyfriends." Um, what? The author touches all of our emotions in this novel which reads like a voyage of self-discovery. I'm glad I found this sweet and sour story. This book is funny, and it's sad. And then it's funny again, and then it's sad. And then it's funny—well, you get my meaning. Just be warned, you need to empty your bladder before you sit down to read it, because you'll laugh until you pee. Like when the author says (paraphrasing) after a night of wine drinking she was sure her check liver light was on. You'll feel like Dickens little Oliver Twist because when you get to the end you'll be screaming

In *Mommy Tried To Kill me* Suzy Soro takes the reader on a brilliantly dark, witty, and often times poignant virtual tour that includes caring for her ailing mother in France, her life in Hollywood, and her own emotional roller coaster world of standup comedy. She careens around decades of time and space with the same surefire dramatic and sarcastic genius of *Vonnegut's Slaughterhouse-Five*. Ms. Soro has found a way to deal with the sensitive and painful reality we all have to face when caring for a parent whose health and mind begins to fail. She does so with wit, wisdom, and the perfect balance of humor and self-realization. Each paragraph is chocked full of hilarious and intelligent one-liners that tells you that this is a comedian at the top of her literary game.

I have been reading the writings of Suzy Soro for over a decade now. She is a stand up comedian and started blogging and writing her humor stories on line. (*Hollywood: Where Hot Comes To Die*) Now she has penned her stories to books. Her first book *Celebrity sTaker* (available on) had me constantly bothering her for another book. Well, she had to go to Paris to take care of her Mom, and now we have her second book. *Mommy Tried to Kill Me*. Timing is everything.... I waited and waited for this book. Now I know why. This is the kind of book you just can't fly through. You have to read and set it down so you can adsorb what she has just said. Let the feeling and situations fill you up. Emotions of crying and laughing at the same time come through. All of us with aging parents can benefit from this book. It will shed light for some. Sometimes you have to see through other peoples eyes... before you can see it for yourself... this has helped me open mine. It has also taught me to look within as Suzy has had to do. Heart Wrenching with a side bar of Hysterical laughter. Breath taking situations with love ones. Truths, Life lessons, learning and growing with aging parents.
