

This book is outstanding!It provides a clear, simple listing of ideas to structure your toddler's day. Ideas such as play group time (socializing), structured time with siblings, daddy time, watching mom and dad talk time (learning self control) help the child learn that life does not revolve around them. I am specifically a Christian, but it can be used by any faith (he only talks about prayer time/spiritual time). This book is a must for a mom who wants order in her life. However, I will say that it is increasingly difficult to follow the guidelines these days with all the chaos present in families. Unfortunately, the concepts here are hard to apply if you are not in a stable, secure marriage with some regular income. Anything outside this invites chaos and complaints. Mr. Ezzo is not popular with dissidents and riotous folks so don't be surprised that so many people attack him personally.

This book not only gives tips on what to do, it also gives tutorials on why. This lets parents gain the ability to problem solve on their own.

I can't say enough positive things about this book. We read it when my son started walking (11m) he

isn't talking at all yet and he refuses to sign to us. The book was very helpful because it provided some commands and direction for me. My son now listens when I ask him not to touch something. When I ask him to come to me he listens most of the time. It is really helpful. I would recommend this to anyone who needs some direction or spots a behavior they think might not be something they want their child doing.

Great follow-up to Baby Wise. Gives great practical advise for discipline, even though some concepts can be modified. Would defiantly recommend to new parents.
